Keyway Report on Our Speaker
David Mitchell, Atlanta Preservation Center
July 11, 2025 | AWER Weekly Meeting

Past President, RY2025, **Jared Evans** presented **Mr. David Mitchell**, Executive Director of the Atlanta Preservation
Center, who delivered a dynamic presentation on the purpose and importance of preservation. He described many accomplishments of the Center benefiting Atlanta and the

greater metro area.

David presented details of the L.P. Grant Mansion, built in Grant Park by **Lemuel Pratt Grant** in 1856. Born in Frankfort, Maine, Grant came to Atlanta in 1840 as a railroad engineer. Over the next 40 years, he prospered as he built Georgia's railroads and secured Atlanta's place as a major railroad center. Promoted through the ranks, he became president of the Atlanta and West Point Railway (1881–87) and the Western Railroad of Alabama (1883–87), and helped incorporate several other railroads along the way. In 1843, Grant invested in land in what is now Southeast Atlanta, paying from \$0.75 to \$2 an acre, and built his home in the center of the property. It was 100 acres southeast of his mansion that he donated to the city in 1882 for a park—now known as Grant Park—"so children would have a place to play and adults a chance for rest and peace from their daily routine."

David noted that this house became a hospital during the Civil War. It is also the birthplace of world golf legend **Bobby Jones**. The house was later purchased by **Margaret Mitchell**. David noted the substantial effort made over the last fifty years to preserve this Atlanta icon.

He also gave substantial detail on the \$13M+ renovation of the historic Odd Fellows Building at 250 Auburn Avenue, now on the National Register of Historic Places. Built in 1913 by **Mr. Herman Perry**, the building is owned by Georgia Works and enables homeless housing, offices, and retail spaces at street level. Georgia Works houses up to 164 men at any given time who are seeking to turn their lives around with employment and good living. David provided vignettes on several projects representing iconic images, celebrating some of Atlanta's historic sites and culture. Not only do we need to preserve our historic structural heritages, David insists, but we also need to be committed to institutions like the Atlanta Public Schools as essential resources for preparing children to live lives of value and service.

In his remarks, Mitchell emphasized that historic preservation is not just about buildings, but about identity, memory, and the community stories that architecture holds. His visual presentation highlighted both celebrated and lesser-known sites across Atlanta. He reflected on the intersection of preservation, race, access, and cultural legacy.

Mitchell also shared his national work as Chair of the Penn Center in South Carolina, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the first schools in the South for formerly enslaved

people. His leadership in documenting, protecting, and promoting these spaces invites all of us to consider how we shape history and how it, in turn, shapes us.

David devoted space to present and honor his father, **Martin A. Mitchell**, longtime Rome City Commission member and chair. David said his dad passed away when he was 23 but had already made a major impact on David and countless others. Mr. Mitchell was instrumental in getting the Rome City Commission to approve January 15th, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, as an official holiday at a time when doing so faced heavy opposition. David holds clear memories of his father promoting a life centered on giving, not just taking—emphasizing that success lies not in greed or self-focus but in living a lifestyle of caring. David clearly has internalized these beliefs. He commits fully to a way of living that sustains and protects our past cultural treasures in order to guide us toward better decisions in the future.
